

The 2004 season is shaping up to be a great one with something for everyone and it's a wonderful chance to encourage more boats to join in the fun of racing.

Additions this year included a January 10th discussion group at St. Francis, two mid-winter race weekends with the Corinthian Yacht Club (CYC) series, and there will be a pre-season full-day Race Clinic at St. Francis YC on March 27th.

For the Season Championship, we've laid out dates and venues that will make a fine season, including the traditionally fun Vallejo Race opener, a nice mid-summer break, and a fun late season climax.

You will notice that we have included two 2-race days: June 5th and September 25th. That will be a total of 10 races, but we will allow two throwouts so that someone who has to miss one of the 2-race days, or the Vallejo weekend, could still be in good shape for the Season Championship. We had a wonderful time with the Nationals Regatta last October, and it should be even better for 2004.

January 10th Race Meeting (see web site write up)

We had 27 racers attending, representing 15 boats. Commodore Harry Farrell opened the meeting with the comment that I-36, a fleet of 30-year old boats, was getting attention as one of the fastest growing and largest fleets on the Bay. We reviewed the race schedule, racing eligibility and proposed rule changes. THANKS TO PETER SZASZ for hosting the meeting at the St. Francis, with a great social lunch in the Grill Room afterward.

Upcoming Race Clinic March 27th St. Francis YC

Please check the web site for details. This clinic replaces the one that has sometimes been scheduled before spring meetings at SFYC. However, racers whose boats have not yet been measured can bring their boats to the Spring Meeting at SFYC in Belvedere on March 13th as well as the Race Clinic on March 27 at the St. Francis YC.

REVISION TO RACING BY-LAWS: Proposed revisions will be voted on by the membership at the I-36 Spring Meeting on March 13th. The revisions update allowable sail materials, sail construction, and procurement, and various provisions to handle deviations from the rules. See copy of proposed revisions on our web site. Does Your Boat Measure Up. . . to race?

If your boat hasn't been measured to race with the I-36 Fleet, you'll need to get it measured and obtain the requisite Measurement Certificate before the first race on May 1st.

Filling out the entry form for the season is effectively an agreement to sail by the class rules. Boats previously measured don't have to be measured again unless a measurement has been changed on the boat.

We will measure boats at the March 13th Spring Meeting (San Francisco YC) as well as at the Race Clinic at St. Francis YC March 27th.

F-36 Wild Flower Beached by Hurricane, Relaunched by Friends

A friend of Ron and Karen Damsen passed this story along, commenting, "You've got a good seaworthy boat!"

Hurricane Marty at purportedly 80-90 knot winds, caused "the most destruction ever to the cruising fleet in Mexico. . . Regrettably she leaves a tremendous trail of destruction, particularly in some parts of La Paz and in Puerto Escondido." (**Lectronic Latitude 38**, 9/23/03).

"Yeah!!! A cheer rose from the crowd gathered to see the re-floating of Freeport 36 "Wild Flower" from the mangroves in the "Waiting Room" (an anchorage up in the Sea of Cortez). About 9 p.m., the pretty boat came sliding off her bed of branches and leaves, down to the water again. It was a happy moment, one anticipated for days by all of the cruising community here in Puerto Escondido."

[This account is from Robin, a friend of Lynne Stevens who owns "Wild Flower," which was blown ashore when Hurricane Marty blew up into the Sea of Cortez. Lynne was in Michigan visiting her mother, so Robin and Marty of "The Cat's Meow" and other boaters at Puerto Escondido got her boat back into the water.]

November 11, 2003 - RE: I-36 Update Rick & Sandy (Van Mell):

Sounds like you had a great time [Fall Meeting Nov. 8]. Sorry I couldn't be there. I had planned to come out and race in the "Nationals" but a job change precluded me from doing that. Hope to be there next year.

Sailing on Lake Erie was not great this year. Water levels are down and there were a number of weekends when it was either raining or the wind was less than desirable. I hope next year lends itself to better weather. ~ Jeff Crosby, Bellevue, OH, "Taboo"

"Folks took pictures, though it was completely dark when Wild Flower decided to give up her stately position in the vegetation. I (Robin) was the person directing the spotlight onto the boat while Martin revved the engine of *The Cat's Meow* and gently pulled Wild Flower free. Larry of *Champagne* and Dario of *Ballena* were working the line attached to the mast, Bill of *Summer Wind* was onboard directing traffic, at least three dinghies in the water were shining flashlights on the lines.

"A rounding cheer filled the night air when the vessel floated on water for the first time since the morning of the hurricane on Monday! Larry the diver checked the hull, and declared her solid. The only "damage" is mostly cosmetic - the hull on the starboard side is slightly scratched in a few places, the dirt from the mangroves is stuck in some places, it looks like there is a garden growing on your deck from all the leaves left from the bushes....and, there may be a mangrove mouse on the boat....hmmmm.

"But other than that, Wild Flower is fine!!!! Bill was able to STEER her to the mooring where she is at least temporarily placed. The rudder is good, the hull is good, there is no water and no holes and YOU ARE SOOOO LUCKY!!! Almost every mooring in the Waiting Room had problems. Marty was a very very very nasty storm, and he has wreaked havoc all the way from Los Barilles at least to Bahia de Los Angeles, and perhaps also in the San Felipe area. This was a major damage storm.

But you do not need to worry. Maybe someone with a cat will let it loose on the boat and take care of the mouse, too. Four of us boat gals cleaned up the tossed and tumbled stuff inside Wild Flower earlier today, and we secured everything we could think of before the jolt of re-floating. No one went inside afterward, as it was way too dark, but perhaps we will in the next few days, just to be sure all is OK. Some of the expensive items were taken off the boat and stored on Summer Wind and will be replaced, since all is OK now.

That is the report from Puerto Escondido. Hasta pasta for now (it is almost midnight here right now.)"

MINUTES of the Fall Meeting, Islander 36 Association November 8, 2003

Measurer Paul Tara reported that 15 boats were measured for racing; next year all boats that want to race have to be measured before hitting the starting line if they haven't already been measured. Paul said he is ready, willing and able to measure everyone in time for next season.

Rick Van Mell, Webmaster, noted that we now have on our website a whopping 145 pages and 2,730 pictures. Rick received an ovation from the crowd for our stellar website.

Barb Henderson thanked all officers, chairs and members for their input to the Newsletter, and requested members continue their contributions of newsworthy items.

Cruise Captains Charles & Kathryn Hodgkins distributed wine glasses (engraved with the I-36 logo) to 2003 cruisers, gave a bottle of wine to Cruise Coordinators, then gave a new trophy, the Charles Winton Annual Cruising Award, to Jim "Smokey" & Laurie Stover (Solace) who attended all of this year's cruises. New Cruise Captain Dennis Bush distributed a draft of proposed

Race Captains Mike & Daphne Dickson gave engraved glass beer mugs to racers. They presented Jim Robinson (Pilot) with the Buster Hammond Half Hull Trophy for 1st Place in the I-36 Racing Season--as well as the new Winton Half Hull Trophy for winning the I-36 Nationals Regatta held at SFYC in October. More engraved glasses and flags went to Season winners (published in Oct. Newsletter) and special awards were given to Nationals winners (2nd: Windwalker; 3rd: Tenacious; 4th: Mischief; 5th: Zenith.)
